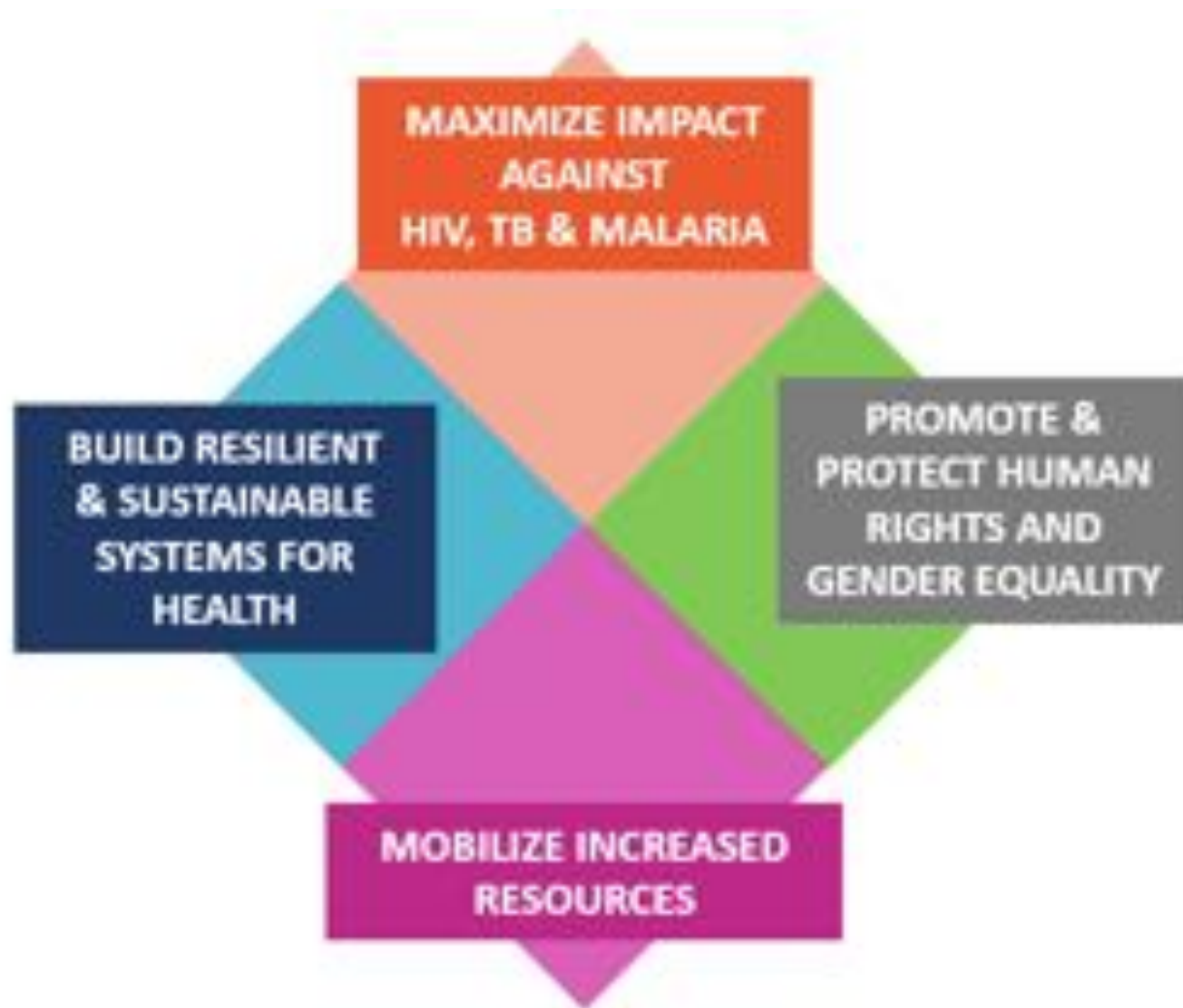

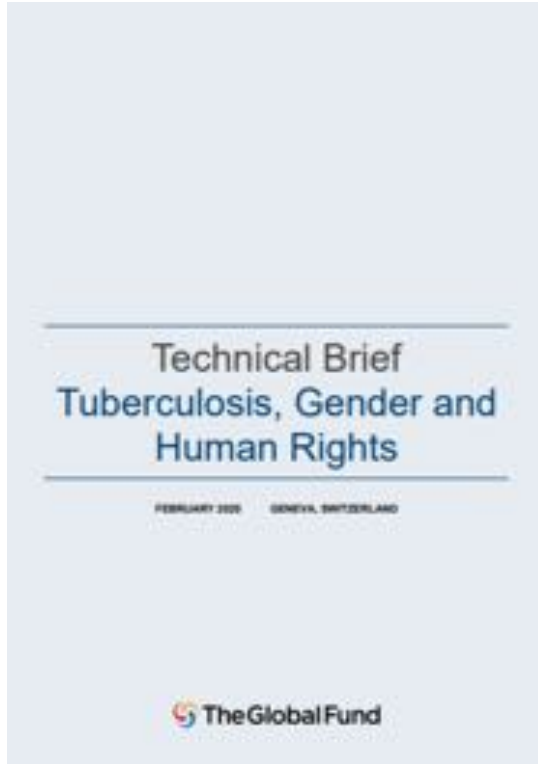
GLOBAL FUND STRATEGY: 2017-2022



Promoting and protecting human rights and gender equality is required to accelerate the end of the epidemics

- ◆ Scale-up programs to support women and girls, including programs to advance sexual and reproductive health and rights
- ◆ Invest to reduce health inequities including gender- and age-related disparities
- ◆ Introduce and scale-up programs that remove human rights barriers to accessing HIV, TB and malaria services
- ◆ Integrate human rights considerations throughout the grant cycle and in policies and policy-making processes
- ◆ Support meaningful engagement of key and vulnerable populations and networks in Global Fund-related processes

UNDERSTANDING 'HUMAN RIGHTS PROGRAMS' IN TB



1. **Stigma and discrimination** reduction
2. **Medical ethics & human rights Training** at health care setting
3. Training of **law-makers and law enforcement** officials
4. Reducing **gender-related barriers** in the context of TB
5. **'Know-your rights'** – legal literacy for communities & patients
6. Programs to address breach of **confidentiality and privacy**
7. **Legal aid & legal support** - Community para-legal programs
8. **Monitoring and reforming** policies, regulations and laws relating to HIV and TB
9. **Mobilizing and empowering** patient and community groups
10. Ensuring rights-based TB programs in **prisons and other closed settings**

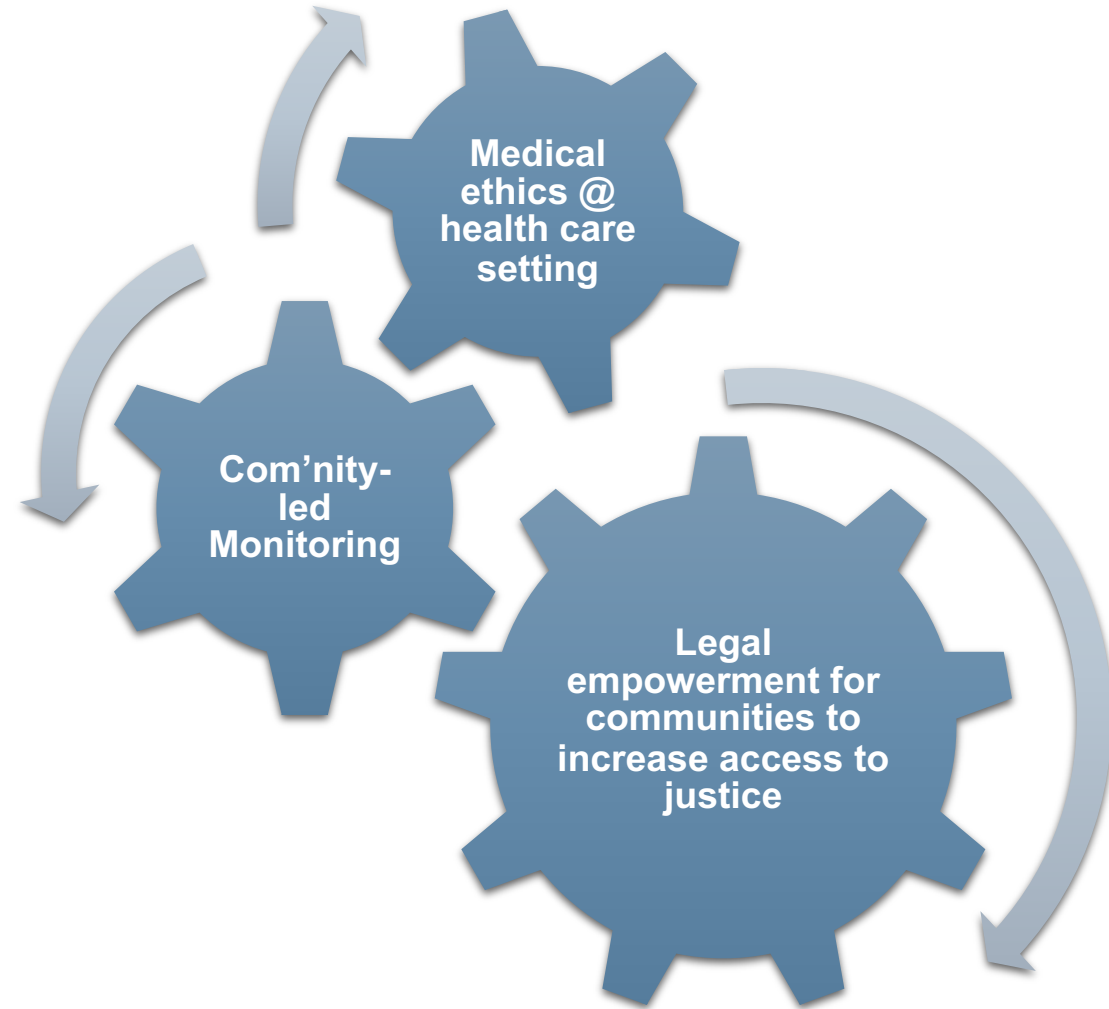
Comprehensive, Integrated, and Practical

In Ghana - **programs to reduce stigma and discrimination** in health care settings; **community-based monitoring** of service quality and stock-outs; **Hotline** to human rights organizations and pro-bono lawyers; and **legal aid and legal counselling**.

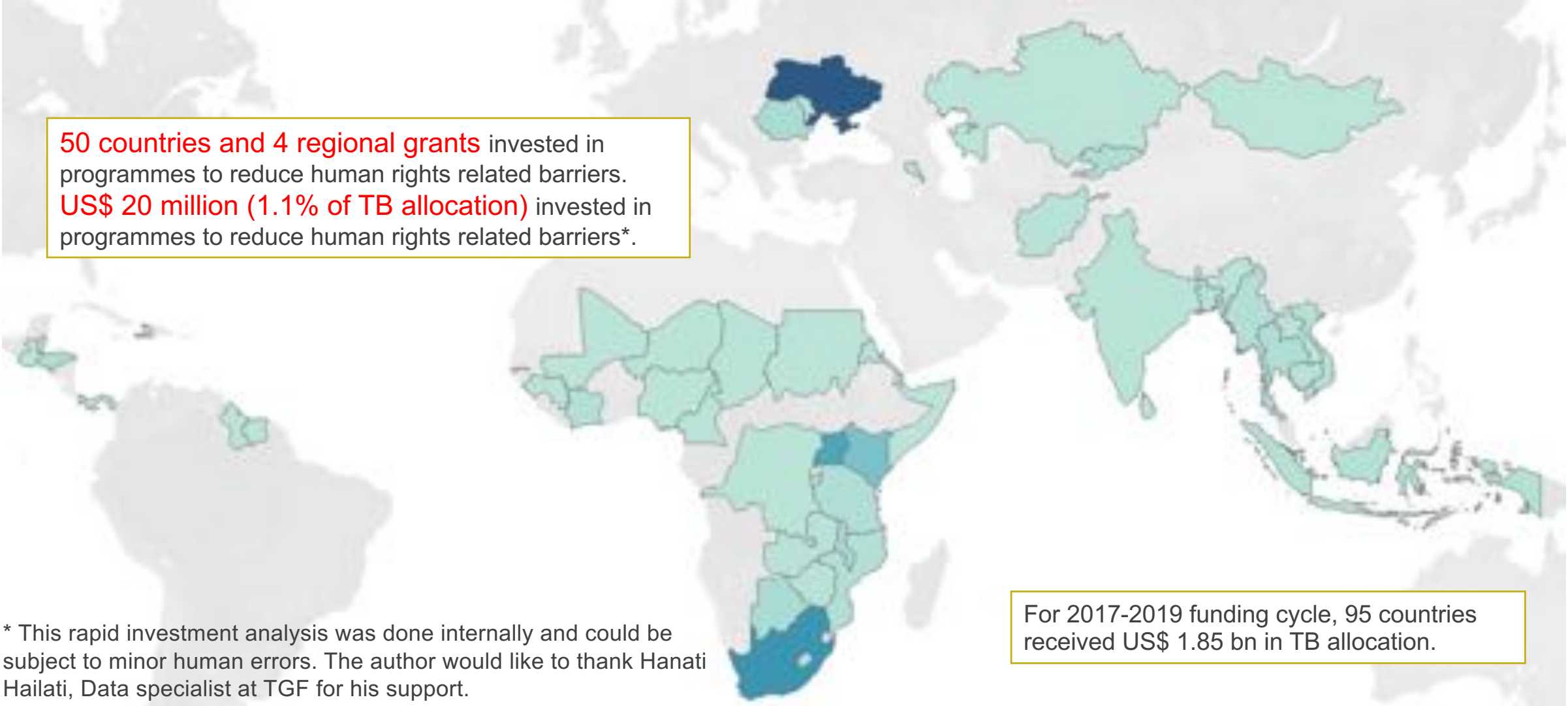
In Kenya- Training of **Community Champions** (TB, HIV, malaria); development of cadre of **pro bono lawyers** in the TB context; **Multi-sectoral engagement** on TB-related barriers.

In DRC- TB community is implementing **CLM** (OneImpact) to **monitor service quality & stock-outs**.

In Ukraine – integration of **psychosocial support**, including **stigma reduction efforts** on DOT programs.



Where do we fund human rights in TB?



50 countries and 4 regional grants invested in programmes to reduce human rights related barriers. US\$ 20 million (1.1% of TB allocation) invested in programmes to reduce human rights related barriers*.

For 2017-2019 funding cycle, 95 countries received US\$ 1.85 bn in TB allocation.

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Sub-objective 1: Amplify the **participation and voice** of key and vulnerable population communities in policy and decision-making fora and in governance and stewardship of the response to the three diseases

Sub-objective 2: To strengthen the **influence** of populations most vulnerable to and affected by TB on the design and implementation of national strategies and costed plans, so that they adequately reflect and respond to realities and needs associated with human rights, gender, community responses and community systems strengthening

Sub-objective 3: To empower populations most vulnerable to and affected by TB to **generate and use data** to monitor program coverage and quality and national commitments to end the three epidemics and to utilize the evidence generated for advocacy and programmatic action

Short-term technical assistance

Peer to Peer Technical Assistance, delivered by 26 Civil Society TA providers, enhancing learning and empowering communities.



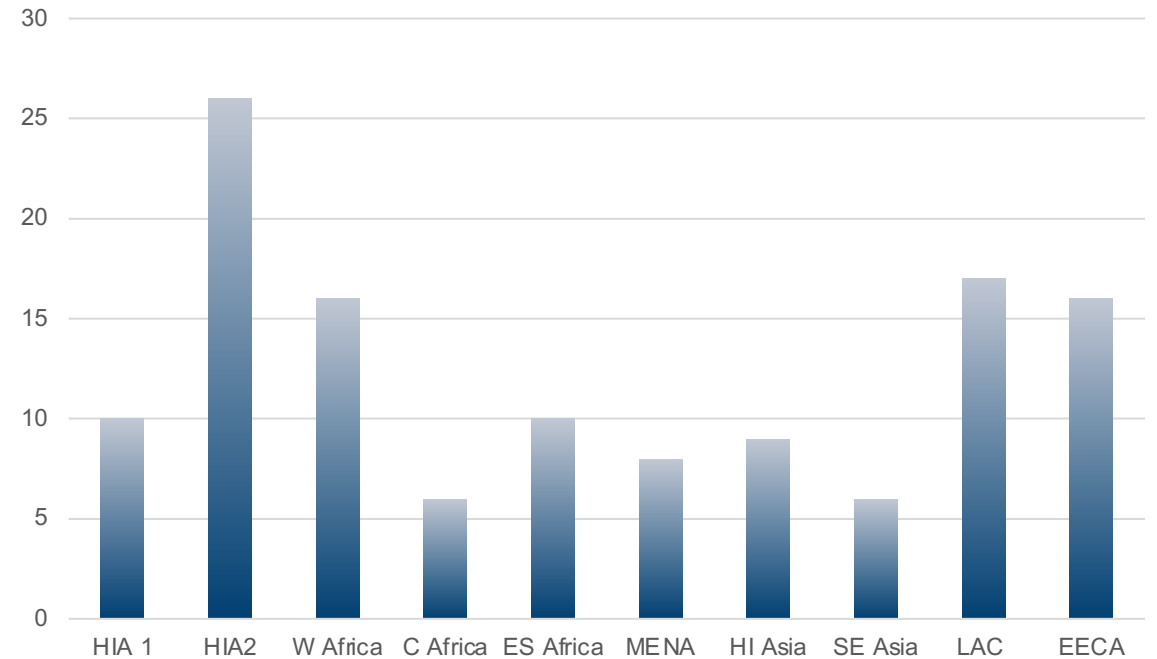
Examples:

- Example 1: TA was provided to a regional ex-mineworkers association to adapt an existing community-led monitoring scorecard for HIV, to make it suitable for TB as well (Multicountry).
- Example 2: TA supported a situational assessment of barriers to TB services for women and the development of recommendations on how to address them (Tajikistan).

Achievements 2017-2019

- **185 eligible requests** received as of 31 December 2020, 185% increase over 65 eligible requests in the Special Initiative
- Technical assistance delivered in **70 countries**, including 18 challenging operating environments
- **8 TA requests** delivered focused on **TB** and **40 TA requests** delivered focused on **HIV/TB**

Technical Assistance on Community, Rights and Gender

General overview and guidelines for application

The Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria is committed to supporting the meaningful engagement of civil society and communities, including marginalized and vulnerable populations, in Global Fund-related processes throughout the funding cycle. Inclusive and meaningful engagement of those most affected by the three diseases is crucial to ensuring that Global Fund investments are evidence- and rights-based, and gender- and age-responsive, in order to maximize impact of Global Fund grants and strengthen local accountability.

In order to ensure that civil society and communities meaningfully engage in Global Fund-related processes, the Global Fund Board has approved the Community, Rights and Gender Strategic Initiative (CRG SI) for implementation from January 2021 to December 2023. These guidelines outline the technical assistance available as part of the CRG SI.

Who can apply for CRG technical assistance?

The following stakeholders from countries eligible for Global Fund funding as well as from countries included in regional grants can apply for CRG technical assistance:

1. Key population networks and organizations
 2. Youth-led networks and organizations
 3. Women's networks and organizations
 4. Networks or organizations of people living with HIV or affected by tuberculosis or malaria
 5. Civil society networks and organizations led by or working with other affected communities (e.g. migrants, refugees, miners)
- Applications from Country Coordinating Mechanisms (CCMs) and Regional Coordination Mechanisms (RCMs) will be considered only if they are developed and submitted in collaboration with one of the above stakeholders. Priority will be given to requests from groups, organizations or consortia residing in the country where technical assistance will be deployed.

What type of CRG technical assistance can be requested?

Technical assistance can be requested throughout the Global Fund funding cycle and in relation to HIV, tuberculosis, malaria as well as resilient and sustainable systems for health (RSSH). Furthermore, support can be requested for sustainability and transition planning and in-country processes linked to the Global Fund model of work (e.g. National Strategic Plan review and development). Within this broader framework, CRG technical assistance requests should be

What type of CRG technical assistance can be requested?

A) Situational analysis and needs assessment

- CRG-related assessments to generate **strategic information** for better decision-making
- Program reviews to ensure **community perspectives** inform service delivery improvements

B) Engagement in country dialogue processes

- **Community consultation** to inform priorities for national policies, guidelines, plans and programs
- Coordinating input into key **Global Fund-related processes** (e.g. NSP or funding request)
- Engagement planning **to strengthen participation of communities** in Global Fund processes
- Caucusing and collective strategizing for coordinated **community-led advocacy**

C) Supporting design and implementation arrangements

- Mapping of civil society and community organizations and activities to strengthen community systems
- Refining or validating tools that support community engagement in Global Fund-related processes
- Workshop(s) to strengthen knowledge of civil society and communities on the Global Fund

CRG Technical Assistance does **NOT** support:

CCM strengthening (e.g. training of CCM members in their roles and responsibilities); Long-term capacity development of civil society networks and organizations (e.g. organizational development, support to become a Global Fund recipient); Development of stand-alone tools that lack a focus on community engagement; Funding request writing.

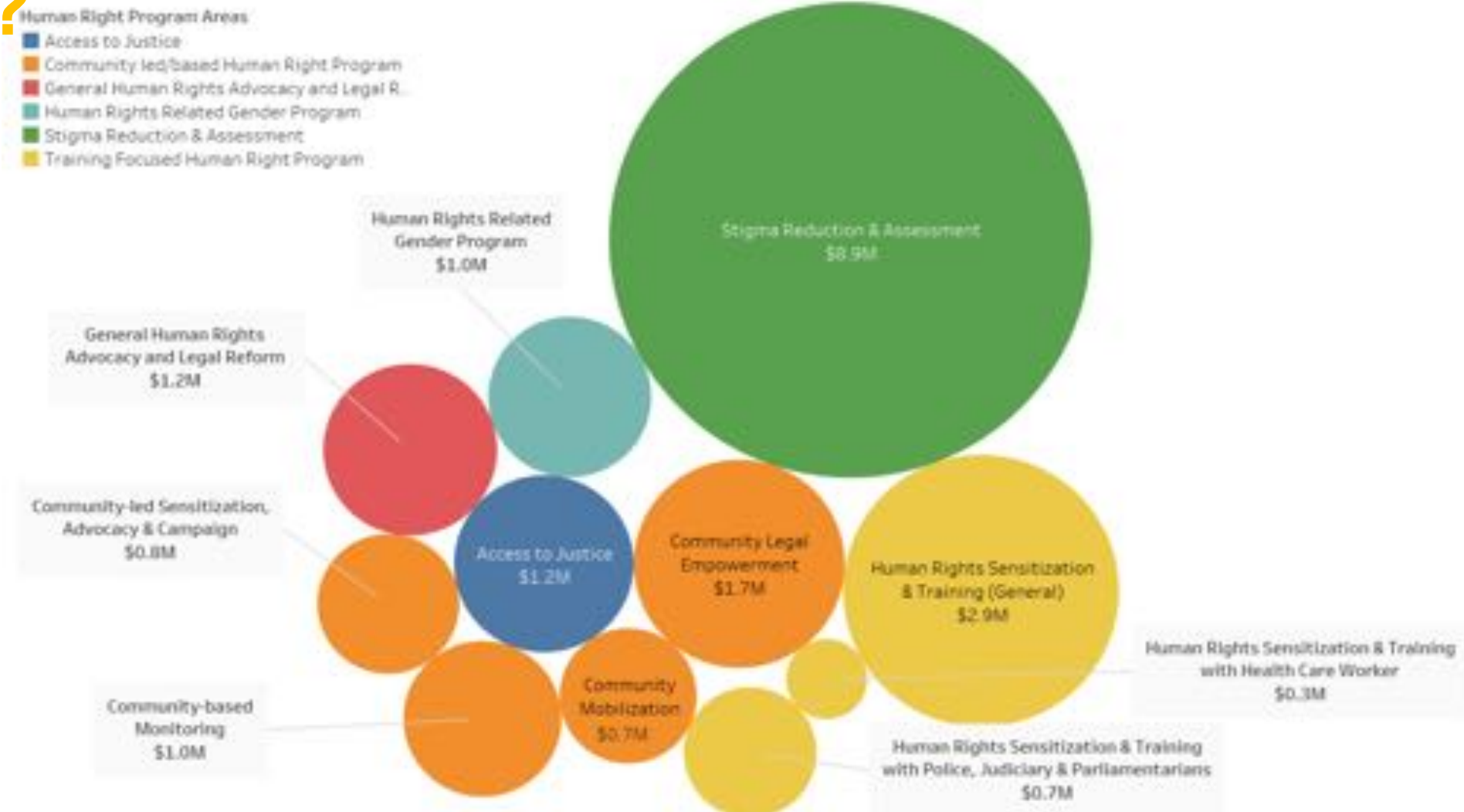
