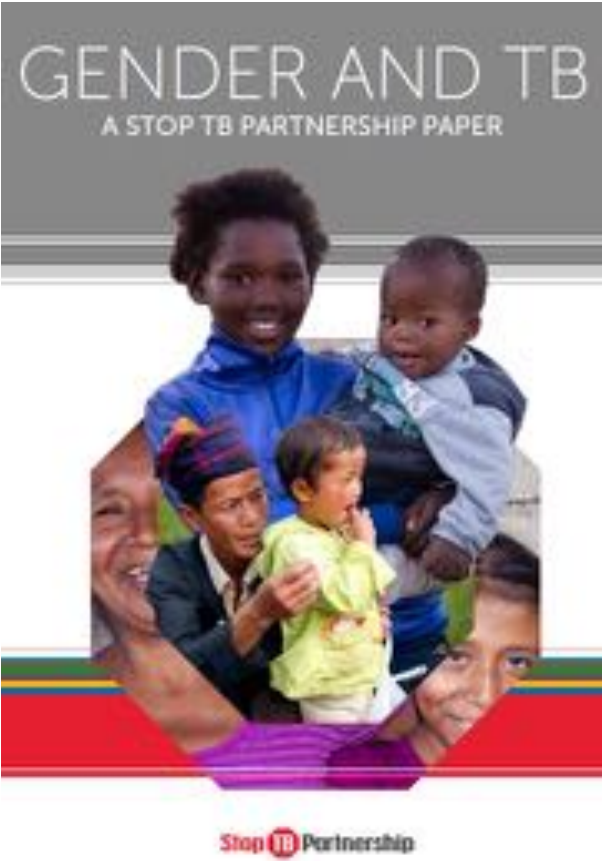

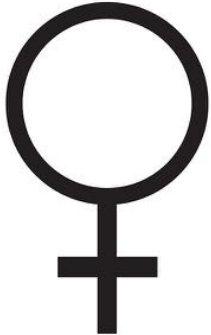

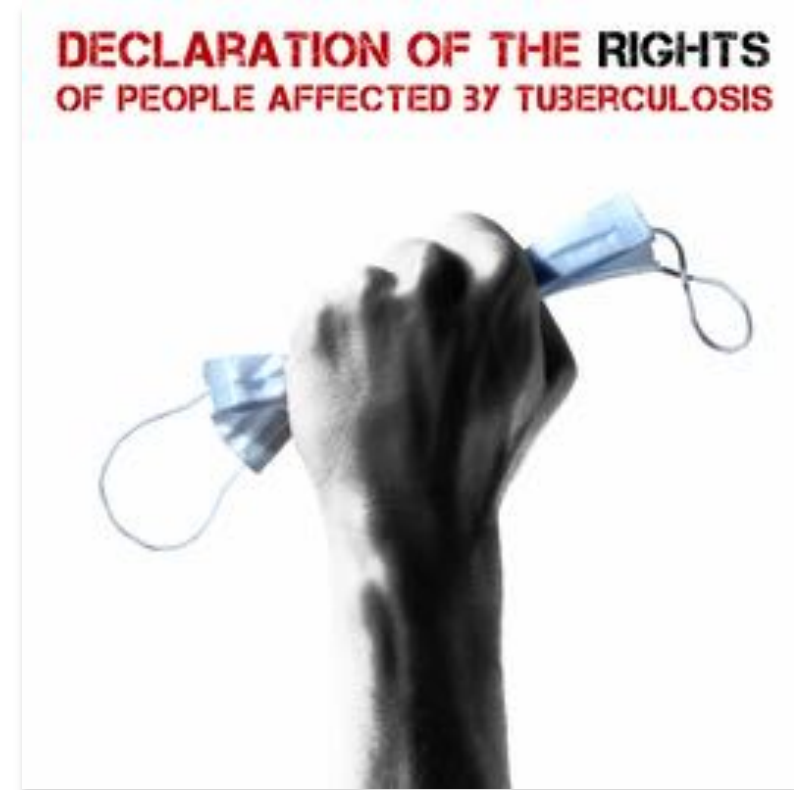

Assessment Questions

- Which KVPs should be prioritized locally and how does KVP affiliation shape vulnerability, diagnosis, treatment outcomes and the impact of TB disease?
- To what extent and how are TB communities engaged, empowered and, when necessary, provided with access to redress in the TB response?
- How does the legal and policy framework set or contradict the conditions for a rights- and **gender-responsive TB response** and how does this manifest in practice?
- How does the local **gender context and norms shape vulnerability, diagnosis, treatment outcomes and the impact of TB disease?**

Costed CRG Action Plans

- To better meet the needs of prioritized KVPs
 - To strengthen TB affected community and civils society meaningful engagement.
 - To improve a rights-based TB response.
 - To transform TB response into a **gender-sensitive and gender-transformative one.**
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Four Stage Process

1. Inception and Adaptation,
2. Data Collection
3. Analysis and Report Writing,
4. Action planning and dissemination.

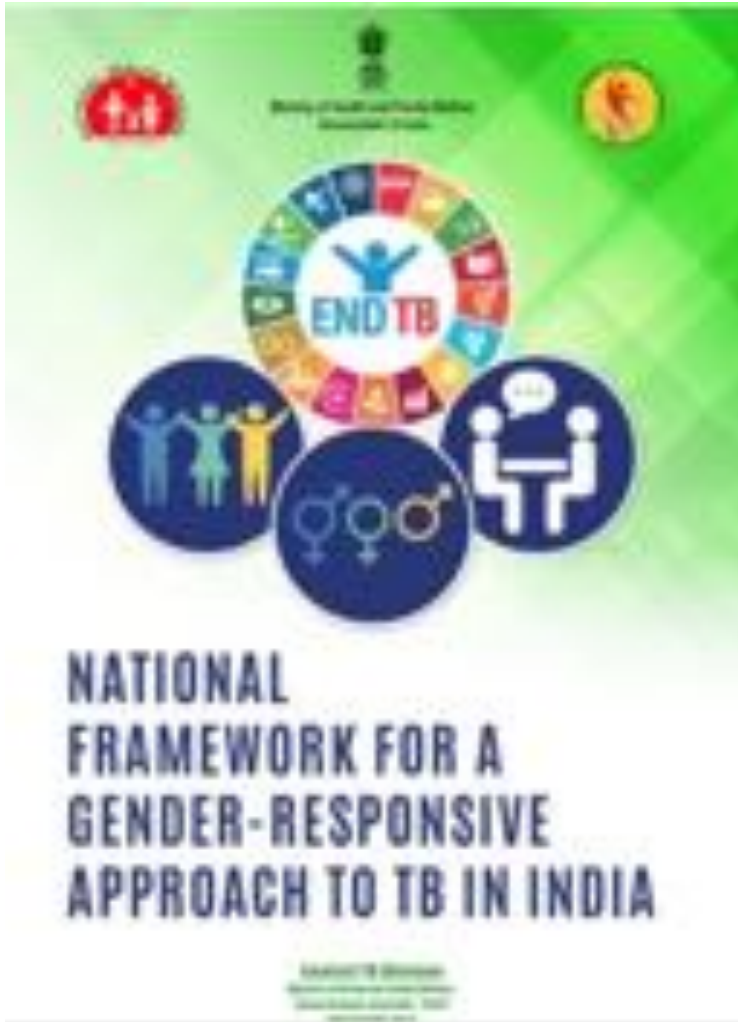
